GAN SHALOM / NURSERY SCHOOL

1.9 Years – 5 Year Olds

This program offers a quality Jewish preschool experience in a safe, relaxed and nurturing environment. We believe in fostering each child's natural curiosity, imagination, problem solving skills and creativity. Children are encouraged to experiment with a variety of materials while participating in individual and group activities. The curriculum includes story time, music, art, cooking, movement, the celebration of Shabbat and Jewish holidays, and more.

GAN SHALOM / SUMMER PROGRAM

1.9 Years – 5 Year Olds

This program is the perfect time to help your child transition into the pre-school environment. It offers children a variety of activities appropriate for their age and development. Children play indoors in air-conditioned classrooms, and outdoors where sprinklers and a water slide are available. Special activities are planned for each week and include Red, White and Blue, Under the Sea, Pajama Day and Crazy Hat Day.


FAMILY HAVUROT supervised by Rabbi Jodie

Synagogue School

Children build community within their age groups and come together in the study of Torah, Jewish Values and Acts of Ethical Kindness. Through song, prayer and stories they deepen their knowledge of Hebrew. We teach Torah as a living document that serves not only as a record of our people's experiences, but as a blueprint for our lives today. Our synagogue school is integrated into our larger synagogue community and draws upon its resources. We seek to create a caring community within our school which reflects our congregation.

KINDERGARTEN, FIRST GRADE/ALEF

Thursdays, 4:15 - 6:15PM

We join in song and prayer with our youngest students, welcoming them into the Synagogue School learning community. Through a holiday-based curriculum, Hebrew as a living language, and family involvement, we integrate our youngest learners into the larger RSNS community. Each family may participate in the class by providing dinner for the students and by bringing a special ritual object from home for show and tell. **Start date 9/13.**

SECOND - SIXTH GRADE/BET – VAV Members Only

Families choose one of the two following educational options:

Option 1. SHABBAT SCHOOL Start date 9/8.

Tuesdays, 4:15 - 6:15PM, Friday Evening or Saturday Morning

This two-day-a-week option addresses a desire for direct parental involvement in your child's Jewish education and fosters Shabbat learning. On Tuesdays, students receive Hebrew instruction and attend school community programs including Tefillah Breira (electives) in groups with the Tuesday/Thursday students. The second day of attendance is either a Friday evening or a Saturday morning. One Friday evening each month (when family services are held), students engage in "classroom" activities from 6:00-7:25PM. At 7:30PM parents join their children for Family Services. The remaining sessions meet on Saturday mornings from 9:00 - 11:00AM and include Torah study and services.

Option 1. SHABBAT SCHOOL cont.

One Saturday a month is designated as a B'Yahad (Together) Service with Cantor Eric and Rabbi Jodie. A parent is required to attend the B'Yahad Service with their child. For the first hour, two simultaneous Torah study groups are held - one for adults and one for children, followed by a one-hour family Shabbat service. Our community is invited to attend both the adult Torah study and family service. **Start date: 9/8.**

Option 2. Tuesdays/Thursdays, 4:15 - 6:15PM

Tuesdays are for Hebrew instruction and school community programs including Tefilla Breira* (electives). On Thursdays, the focus is on Torah, Tefilla (prayer service), Jewish Values and Acts of Ethical Kindness. **Start date: 9/6.**

Tefilla Breira (prayer electives) or "Breirot"

Students have a chance to try something new by focusing on a particular type of prayer activity. They explore different ways to access prayer, for example, through storytelling, social action, yoga, Israeli dancing and creative writing sessions led by our staff.

KIDS' CHOIR with Cantor Eric (optional) Members only

Tuesdays, 6:15 - 6:30PM

The Kids' Choir is open to all synagogue school students in grades gimel-vav. Kids learn contemporary Shabbat music including Camp Havaya (aka Camp JRF/NFTY) tunes, folk songs and other popular melodies. Kids' Choir sings at every Friday evening family service, and joins the adult choir for a special musical service in the winter. The choir also performs at nursing homes and at community holiday events. **Start date: 10/2.**

OR HADASH with Cantor Eric and our Shinshinim

Grades 4 - 6, Saturdays, 7:00 - 9:30PM

Our junior youth group is called Or Hadash (New Light). Participants get together for monthly ice cream Havdalah movie nights, and take a trip to volunteer at a Jewish soup kitchen in NYC. **Dates: 10/13, 11/17, 1/12, 2/9, 3/9, 5/18.**

ASHOKAN RETREAT

Grades 3 – 6, Friday 12/14 – 16

At Ashokan we experience Shabbat together. We spend time outside hiking, connecting with nature, and playing games through a Jewish lens. It is an opportunity for new bonds, and the deepening of friendships.

Our B'NAI MITZVAH Program

Members Only



We understand that young adults become b'nai mitzvah within the context of family and community. Consequently, each b'nai mitzvah family has an opportunity to involve themselves with Torah study and in enhancing the Shabbat morning service. Each member of our clergy team has a part in guiding our b'nai mitzvah and their families in their endeavors. This holistic approach to b'nai mitzvah reflects the primacy of community in Reconstructionist Judaism.

TUTORING Cantor Eric is responsible for assisting our b'nai mitzvah in acquiring the skills necessary to participate in services Friday night and Saturday morning. He meets with each student weekly, determining their abilities and encouraging them to be the best they can be.

FAMILY D'VAR TORAH Rabbi Jodie is the family guide to the Torah portion of the week for each family. After an initial home visit with Jodie, the family develops its interpretation of the Torah portion, which is presented to the congregation on Shabbat morning.

READINGS Rabbi Lee enables each family to bring themselves to the Shabbat morning experience by helping them to edit a supplement of readings of their choice to complement the many themes found in the service.

KADIMA with Rabbi Jodie, Cantor Eric and Solomon

Members only

Tuesdays, 6:00 - 8:00PM, includes pizza dinner

Our b'nai mitzvah meet with one another weekly for a class directed to developing a Jewish identity. Students are joined by their parents once a month. Beginning with a day-long family retreat (9/15), we form both a spiritual and a learning community where b'nai mitzvah students and their parents encounter Judaism through the eyes of the women, men and children who have helped shape our heritage. **Start date: 9/25.**

SHINSHINIM coordinated by Rabbi Jodie

In partnership with the Sid Jacobson Jewish Community Center (SJCC), the Long Island Chapter of the Israeli Scouts and several area synagogues. We receive two "Shinshinim" – Israeli High School graduates who spend their gap year with us and other local partnering institutions before they commence their mandatory military service in Israel. The Shinshinim program's mission is to bring Israel closer to Jewish communities on Long Island, to foster cross-cultural understanding, and to nurture love of and pride in Israel, particularly for our youth. These two wonderfully dynamic Israelis will each teach a class in our synagogue school and have other opportunities to interact and contribute to our community.



Teens

The RSNS teen program provides many points of entry into synagogue and Jewish life. Our post-Kadima young adults connect with their Jewish identity and community by working with younger students and adult seniors, and participating in social action activities, experiential learning and fun adventures. Bar or bat mitzvah is only the beginning!

ADOPT A SURVIVOR with Rabbi Jodie

Members only

Post-Kadima Year



This program was established by Irving Roth, director of the Holocaust Resource Center at Temple Judea of Manhasset. Mr. Roth has organized a network of Holocaust survivors to serve as “adoptees” for our eighth grade students. These connections provide a vital link to the events of

the Holocaust in a time when there are fewer survivors living to tell their own stories. The process begins with conversations between survivor and adopter. Through a series of meetings held at RSNS under Rabbi Jodie's supervision, the students become “surrogate survivors,” committed to learning and re-telling their survivors' stories to the next generation. Students in this program agree to speak about their survivors in the year 2045, the 100th anniversary of the camps' liberation. The initial session consists of a formal educational piece to provide students with general background information. In subsequent sessions, students meet the survivors and talk with them in detail. Finally, students present their survivors' stories to the Synagogue School and during RSNS' Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Memorial) service. **Parents are welcome, but not required to attend, and take turns providing food for each session. One Wednesday/Month, 5:30 - 7:00PM, 9/12, 10/17, 11/28, 12/12, 1/9, 2/13, 3/13, 4/10. Yom HaShoah program during Synagogue School on 4/30. Yom HaShoah RSNS service 5/1, 7:30PM.**

Being a boy is not always so simple. In this boys-only group, we explore what being a man – specifically, a Jewish man – means, and what we can learn about ourselves and each other. Through activities, games, popular culture, food, discussions and group experiences, we are just guys. **Dates: 10/2, 10/30, 11/27, 12/18, 1/29, 2/26, 3/26, 4/16, 5/28, 6/9 (Summer Sunday “BroBQ”).**

GIRLS ROSH HODESH with Rabbi Jodie **Grades 8 – 12, Tuesdays, 6:30 – 8:00PM**

This program is based on the Jewish tradition of women's New Moon celebrations to build self-esteem, Jewish identity, leadership skills, and friendship networks of adolescent girls. The monthly meetings provide a supportive environment where girls explore the social and cultural issues they encounter as they become adults and derive their own authentic Jewish values in response to the challenges they face. The small groups are designed to provide a celebratory, empowering setting in which girls can support each other in growing and learning, while having lots of fun. The program's success is due, in part, to the participatory mixture of discussing issues, traditions, and role models, as well as making crafts, writing stories, rejoicing with song and dance, socializing, and munching. **Dates: 10/2, 10/30, 11/27, 12/18, 1/29, 2/26, 3/26, 4/16, 5/28, 6/11 (Dinner).**

Madrachim (Aides) are given assignments which include assisting in a classroom, or in the office, Hebrew tutoring, or working one-on-one with students. During training sessions Madrichim enhance their Synagogue School experience through continued learning about Judaism, leadership, Jewish education, professional conduct and teaching techniques.

Madrichim have the option of working Tuesday and/or Thursday 4:00 - 6:30PM, once a month on Friday 6:00 - 8:30PM, and/or Saturdays 9:00 - 11:00AM. Madrichim can be paid or earn community service hours. Learning sessions are 9/4 from 7:00 – 8:00PM, and 11/20, 1/15, 3/19, 5/21 from 6:30 - 8:00PM.
