Rabbi Lee

Dear Friends,

In his eulogy for Ariel Sharon, Vice-President, Joe Biden, called him “a complex man” who “lived in complex times in a very complex neighborhood.” I spoke about then defense minister Sharon from our *bimah* for the first time on Yom Kippur in 1982 following the massacre of Palestinians in the Sabra and Shatila refugee camps in southern Lebanon. His removal from office by Israel’s cabinet in February of 1983 demonstrated that I was no alone in my condemnation of Sharon having been “indirectly responsible” for the killings. Despite this condemnation and humiliation, Sharon went on to hold nearly every top post in Israel’s government. Sharon was again the subject of my condemnation on Yom Kippur in 2000 after his visit to Jerusalem’s Temple Mount accompanied by hundreds of Israeli police officers, a visit that was used by Palestinians as justification for the riots that became the second *intifada*. This time the Israeli public responded to Sharon’s ‘thumb in the eye’ display of power by electing him prime minister a year later in the biggest landslide in Israel’s history.

To my surprise, Sharon first spoke about the inevitability of Palestinian statehood shortly after that election. By the time of his re-election in 2003, Israeli settlers, who had hailed Sharon as their patron two years earlier, condemned him as a traitor. In Sharon’s second government, Israel withdrew from Gaza and from a small portion of the West Bank, and completed much of the 450 mile long barrier that threaded through the West Bank, which he had originally opposed fearing it would become the de facto border for a future Palestinian state. Additional withdrawals of Jewish settlers and Israeli troops were stopped when Sharon suffered a stroke in 2005 from which he never recovered.

These moves by Sharon have mistakenly been called Nixonian in nature. The difference between Richard Nixon’s rapprochement with China and Sharon’s recognition of the inevitability of a Palestinian state the consequent withdrawal from disputed territories, however, is that Sharon’s initiatives were completely unilateral. Palestinians were as surprised by Sharon’s withdrawals as were Israelis leaving a political power vacuum that proved disastrous for the residents of Gaza and undermining for Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas. Though ill conceived, Sharon’s bold actions showed him to be a man who was not bound by ideology, a man who was capable of change for the sake of security.

Ariel Sharon was a man of his generation. A veteran of the 1948 war for independence, of the 1956 Sinai campaign, of the Six Day War, of the Yom Kippur War, and of the Lebanon War, he believed that Jews must assert and defend their collective needs without embarrassment or fear of censure. His embrace of Palestinian statehood, which earned him the opprobrium of the settlers whose cause he had so vigorously championed, demonstrated that he was not hamstrung by ideology, and that he was capable of change for the possibility of even a cold peace. As Vice-President Biden concluded in his eulogy, “[Sharon’s] North Star was the survival of the State of Israel and the Jewish People wherever they resided.” There is no doubt that Israel would be in a better place today if Sharon had been given the strength to carry out his plans; nor is there any question that no one in power in Israel at present has had the vision to run with his baton.

With wishes for peace and security for all the residents of the Land of Yet Unfulfilled Promise, I am, as always,

Our newest students started school on January 14th They are having lots of fun playing, painting, pasting, singing and sharing snack together in our Come Play With Me Class on Tuesday mornings.

During the school year we have a number of health and safety programs for our threes and fours year olds. In December and January the 3's and 4's classes participated in a hearing screening and speech and language screening. In January all the classes participated in a dental health program.

Registration continues for the FALL and our fun filled seven week summer program. Call the nursery school at 627-0257 to register your child.

For 7 weeks this summer, your child can have a wonderful experience at Gan Shalom. Our summer program begins June30th and ends August 15th.

This summer we will offer a four day or 5 day a week program. The three year olds will meet from 9:30 to 12:30 and the four year olds will meet from 9:30 to 1:30. The fours will bring a dairy lunch from home daily.

A daily ½ hour lunch extension is available for 3 year olds. Children will have the opportunity to play indoors in an air-conditioned classroom, and outdoors where **sprinklers** and a **water slide** will be available.

ADULT STUDIES SEMINARS

Our congregation began its history with a seminar on Reconstructionism. It was only after a few years of people coming together to study the writings of Mordecai Kaplan that they decided to hold Shabbat and holiday services. By our engaging in these seminars, we keep alive the intention of our founders, that our spiritual experiences be tied to a self-conscious approach to Judaism grounded in an understanding of the Jewish People's history. To that end, Rabbi Lee will offer the following biweekly seminars.

Previous attendance at either of these seminars is not required, nor is regular attendance necessary. Call Lee at the office (627-6274) or at home (621-2067) with questions.

Biblical Texts: This group has been and continues to be committed to reading every word of the Hebrew Bible (in English translation). After more than a decade and a half, the group has reached the so-called Minor Prophets, minor not in importance, but in the amount of material that has survived of theirs. We will pick up the reading with the Book of Hosea and will move on to some of the more esoteric prophets including Joel and Obadiah. This seminar meets biweekly on Thursday nights from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m. **Dates this month are February 13th and 27th.**

The History of Israel: A Documentary Approach: We began our examination of Zionism five years ago through the lens of the writings of Zionist and anti-Zionist ideologues. Last year we arrived at the founding of the modern State and reached beyond to the Six Day War. We will continue to critically review the development of the State through original source political and sociological documents. This seminar meets biweekly on Shabbat afternoons from noon to 1:30p.m. Dates this month are **February 1st and 15th.**

ADULT B'NAY MITZVAH GROUP

It is thrilling that 15 adults have chosen to make the commitment to engage in study during their adult years. This B'nay Mitzva experience has many components that will prove to make it an important two years. Especially meaningful is the development of a sense of community. We began the year with forming Hebrew reading groups. Thank you to Naomi Weinberg and Sheri Lindner who have served as peer language mentors. Different segments of the course of studies will be taught by Cantor Eric, Rabbi Lee and Rabbi Jodie. We will journey through historical, liturgical, literary and spiritual studies. Each student will engage in Torah study with a smaller group to deliver a *d'var torah* (discussion on the Torah portion), as well as participate in the culminating service as a group. **We will come together weekly Tuesdays 8:00 – 9:30 p.m. (NOTE that there is no class February 18th) and continue through May 27, 2014 this year.** Our formal studies will resume in the fall of 2014 and culminate in a joint B'nay Mitzva **service on June 20, 2015.** These next two years will be exciting and very busy.






