It is now time to register for RSNS Synagogue School for the 2014-2015 academic year. Students currently enrolled in Synagogue School in grades kindergarten through vav will receive registrations forms by mail. Parents must complete the emergency contact information on the registration form, check the accuracy of all other information and return the completed form to RSNS with a deposit of \$250 per student by June 1, 2014. Families will be billed over the summer for the balance of tuition. As usual tuition will be due in full by September 1. Only those members in good financial standing will be guaranteed a place for their children in the appropriate grade. There will be an online form, posted before school begins, to sign up for dismissal volunteer duty. You will receive an email when it is up and running.

To register a child who has not yet attended our Synagogue School, stop by the office or call and we will mail you a registration form. Non-members are welcome to register for kindergarten and alef (first grade) based on available space.

ISRAEL'S 66th

Dear Friends,

I write this missive the day after the second seder, which, in my family, ends with the singing of *Hatikva*, Israel's national anthem. This year's rendition was sung plaintively in the shadow of the soon-to-be-declared failure of America's latest initiative for a two-state solution to the Israeli / Palestinian conflict. The legacy of this round of (non)negotiations is the Palestinian petition to join fifteen international conventions and treaties and tenders by Israel's housing minister for 700 new residential units for Jewish settlement in East Jerusalem.

These activities might be considered to be no more than an affirmation of a status quo for Palestinians and Israelis if the rest of the Middle East and the greater world were stable. But every country surrounding Israel is on the brink, while Central and Eastern Europe seem to be perched on the precipice of the world immediately before the beginning of World War One, the centenary of which will be marked this July. Given Syria and Ukraine in particular, it would be irresponsible for America's Secretary of State to expend more energy on the Israeli / Palestinian conflict at It is clear that both sides are this time. cemented in their respective positions. Unfortunately, the Middle East is grounded in sand – quick sand – and the lack of trust and the recalcitrance on both sides will sink them in the near future along with any possibility of a two-state solution.

The only hope that remains for now is a miracle. We turn to the possibility of the miraculous when we open the door for Elijah, the prophet so of hope, of *tikvah*, toward the seder's end. We share Elijah with our Muslim brothers and sisters, who is called Ilvas in the Koran. Both Muslims and Jews view Elijah as a righteous prophet who waged war against idolatry during the reign of King Ahab and Queen Jezebel. As a Reconstructionist, I see Elijah's coming in the persons of leaders from a new generation who will have abandoned the worship of failed ideologies that have threatened the lives of the children of Israel and of the Palestinian Authority. In anticipation of the sixty-sixth anniversary of the birth of the modern State of Israel, a miracle in itself, we can only hope that new leaders will emerge to secure the dream of a secure co-existence for both peoples living side by side. May it come soon and before it's too late.

SUMMER Toddler Programming

ADULT PROGRAMS and EDUCATION

ADULT STUDIES AND SEMINARS

Our congregation began its history with a seminar on Reconstructionism. It was only after a few years of people coming together to study the writings of Mordecai Kaplan that they decided to hold Shabbat and holiday services. By our engaging in these seminars, we keep alive the intention of our founders, that our spiritual experiences be tied to a self-conscious approach to Judaism grounded in an understanding of the Jewish People's history. To that end, Rabbi Lee will offer the following biweekly seminars.

Previous attendance at either of these seminars is not required, nor is regular attendance necessary. Call Lee at the office (627-6274) or at home (621-2067) with questions.

Biblical Texts: This group has been and continues to be committed to reading every word of the Hebrew Bible (in English translation). After more than a decade and a half, the group has reached the so-called Minor Prophets, minor not in importance, but in the amount of material that has survived of theirs. We will pick up the reading with the Book of Hosea and will move on to some of the more esoteric prophets including Joel and Obadiah. This seminar meets biweekly on Thursday nights from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m. **Dates this month are May 8th and May 22nd.**

The History of Israel: A Documentary Approach: We began our examination of Zionism five years ago through the lens of the writings of Zionist and anti-Zionist ideologues. Last year we arrived at the founding of the modern State and reached beyond to the Six Day War. We will continue to critically review the development of the State through original source political and sociological documents. This seminar meets biweekly on Shabbat afternoons from noon to 1:30 p.m. Dates this month are **May 3rd and May 24th**.
