

RABBI LEE

Dear Friends,

Israel will mark the twentieth anniversary of the assassination of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin on November 4th. His assassin was a religious Zionist who represented those who thought the Oslo Accords, which advocated a 'land for peace' program, to be a sin against God, and that Rabin was the seditious implementer. The question is, would there now be a two-state solution if Rabin had survived the attack? I think not. Before the ink was dry on the agreement, opposition leader, Benjamin Netanyahu, declared the Accords to be deeply flawed. But it wasn't the flaws in the agreement, or the assassin's bullet that prevented a resolution, as much as differences in expectations.

Many years ago, political analyst, Thomas Friedman, observed that the central problem in Palestinian / Israeli negotiations is that though both Israelis and Palestinians think that they are playing the same game on the board composed of red and black squares, they are not. One side is playing chess, and the other side is playing checkers. So it was with Oslo. The handshake on the White House lawn exchanged between the president of the Palestinian Authority and Israel's prime minister demonstrated to Israel that the PLO *finally* acknowledged the existence of the (Jewish) State. For Israelis, that was enough. But the Palestinians rightly thought that Oslo was not an end, but a beginning, which would conclude with the establishment of a sovereign Palestinian state.

The Palestinians never got their state, and recognition alone proved to be not nearly enough to make Israelis secure. The killings of the past several weeks are still more evidence that the twenty-two year long stalemate since Oslo has failed to maintain any semblance of even a profoundly unequal status quo. Although Jewish Israelis to the left rejoiced in the possibilities that came with the Oslo, and while right of center Israeli Jews condemned the Accords as delaying the coming of the Messiah, all Israeli Jews, all Israeli Arabs, and all Palestinians living in the territories and in East Jerusalem are paying for the failure to implement them. We are left with the bodies of the innocent and of the guilty that defile the holy streets of Jerusalem and the secular suburbs of Tel Aviv. Israelis and Palestinians are in the midst of an unending tragedy that may well rival the Hundred Years War unless their leaders can rouse themselves from the stupefaction of absolute ideologies and conflicting historical narratives and vomit forth the poison of hatred for the sake of their children. May it come soon in our time.

FRIDAY NIGHT SERVICES

Friday night services at RSNS are a safe harbor I look forward to all week. To be fair, it took me a year to build up my Friday night habit. When I came to my first Friday night service at RSNS, I was afraid that the prayers would sound strange, and I would feel out of place, and not dressed right. I had been away from any kind of synagogue for fifteen years by then, and out of the habit of going to services regularly for even longer. But I grew up in a conservative synagogue, going to services regularly, and I missed it.

The first deep breath I took that Friday night came when the congregation started singing. That feeling, of everyone singing together, and singing a tune I knew, was such a relief. In regular life, music tends to be something I listen to, on the radio or as background on a TV show, but music in the synagogue is about everyone coming together and singing in unison (for the most part) and resting in this communal wave for a while.

Cantor Eric led us through the melody and kept us in rhythm, and Rabbi Lee joined in with the harmony, and there was a playful feeling between them that stretched to include all of us. And then Rabbi Lee came down from the podium and began a discussion. All around me people were raising their hands to add in their own opinions on, most likely, the political situation in Israel. My Jewish education had included Bible study, modern and biblical Hebrew, prayers and customs and laws and history, but not much about the history of the state of Israel, and certainly not with such even handed and compassionate treatment of everyone involved, including the Palestinians.

And then there was the poetry: four poems scattered through the service to welcome Shabbat, to celebrate nature, to mourn, or to remember the struggle for freedom. Pablo Neruda, Marge Piercy, Ted Kooser and Wendell Berry have become my regular companions (and if you make sure to avoid eye contact with Rabbi

Lee for the first few minutes, you may not even have to be one of the readers!).

What I felt, after that first Friday night service, was a sense of possibility. A sense that this was a place where inspiration could come from, a place where I could come up with my own idea of what it means to be a Jew.

Every Thursday, except for weeks when there's a family service or a musical Shabbat, a topic is presented in the weekly announcements email, so that you can think about your own take on the issue first, or so that you can decide if you really want to push yourself to go to shul this week to talk about *that*. At first I was worried that if I hadn't read the most current issue of the *New York Times* or the *Forward* or the *New Yorker*, I'd be out of the loop, but I've found that I don't have to study up in order to understand.

Rabbi Lee manages to make everyone feel welcome to join in the discussion, including Bar and Bat mitzvah guests, or kids from the synagogue school (with some very strongly held opinions!), or occasional visitors coming in to see what we're all about. There are always more ideas than we have time to explore before *Aleinu*; that's what the oneg is for.

The oneg is a chance to continue the discussion, and get to know the other congregants, and share in the communal coffee, cake, and candy (sometimes when there's a bar or bat mitzvah the special candy table appears — Hershey's kisses! Gummy fish! Tiny cupcakes!). Going to the oneg was awkward for me at the beginning, when I barely recognized people from week to week, but then people began to come over and introduce themselves to me and week by week I started to feel like I belonged.

I've had so many people tell me that they were tired, or down, or not in the mood to come, but they pushed themselves to get in the car and walk through the doors, and then they remembered why it's always worth the effort. The energy in the room sustains you for the rest of the week, or at least the rest of the weekend.
