RABBI LEE

Dear Friends,

My mother was not a saver. She was constantly weeding her possessions so that her children wouldn't have to when death came to her. Though she had beautiful things she treasured – Coalport china, Waterford crystal, Kirk sterling – she left very little for us to deal with. She liked everything to be in order. One of our last conversations concerned a sixty-three cent discrepancy in her bank statement. When she died unexpectedly in March, the only complications left for my niece and me were due to the most untimely death of my sister, my mother's power of attorney, who predeceased her by a few weeks. My mother took leave of the world having taken care of everything she possibly could have, an easement to us who survived her.

What she accomplished with respect to her possessions and finances, she duplicated in her relationships. As she had left nothing undone, so she left nothing unsaid. One of my cousins reported that after the death of her father many years ago, my mother called her twice a week at exactly 7:56 a.m. to check after her welfare. My cousin was not the only recipient of my mother's constant attention. Increasingly apartment bound by arthritis, she used her time to express words of appreciation and praise to those she loved, and to offer 'observations' to those she thought could benefit from them. She felt a commitment to say what needed to be said to everyone who was in her life. She didn't need to tell me how much she loved me on her deathbed,

because she had told me every time we were together in the fullness of her life.

So after spending time cleaning out her apartment in April, there was little left to carry away. Except for the Passover dishes that I promised I would take and use, everything else fit into a shoebox – my father's wallet (which hadn't been opened since his death on July 13, 1984), his good Timex, and letters and cards that my sister and I had sent to my mother over the span of six decades. My mother left this world in perfect order. Looking at Olympic divers entering the water from a thirty-meter board this past summer, and learning that excellence in diving is measured by 'no splash' on impact, I came to understand that my mom lived a gold medal Olympian life. She exited the world with the same elegance as those divers entered the pool.

The way my mother lived and died serves as a blessing and as a lesson for me at this season of introspection and teshuvah. Following her example, I will spend the days between Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur weeding my life and connecting with those to whom I neglected to offer praise or words of appreciation. In this way I hope to enter the New Year 'clean', complete, and without undue splash.

I wish you all a good and healthy 5777. May it be a year of blessing and of healing.



ALL ABOUT RECONSTRUCTIONISM!

WITH RABBI LEE (**NEW for 2016-2017**)

THIS MONTH'S SESSION IS

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 18TH FROM 6:30 – 8:00 p.m.

How often have you been asked to define Reconstructionism? This course will address all questioners, and will satisfy your own curiosity as well. After an introductory session on its place within the context of American Jewish history, Rabbi Lee will offer a topical approach to the study. Topics to be considered will include: the meaning of God, ritual practice, the nature of prayer, the place of Israel, Judaism as a civilization, living in two civilizations – the Jewish and the American, life cycle practices, political action, and Jewish Peoplehood. Topics will be announced in advance for your consideration. One need not attend every session to benefit from the course. The entire RSNS community is invited to attend this monthly course. What does Chinese food in America in its dizzying variety, say about who we are—or are not—today?

Cantor's Dinner

This past year's topic for the Cantor's dinners was *Jews on the Fringes*. These are generally small, forgotten, Jewish communities around the world, and each community opens up a whole new world. We learned about a real estate developer in a Siberian town, trying to get money together for a Jewish community center with movie theatres and gyms and, sure, a synagogue too. And then there were the Kaifeng Jews, and the Shanghai Jews. Suddenly China doesn't seem so far away, if you know there are Jews there, saying the same prayers you do, and arguing over the same inane differences in customs that we argue about here. It's such a relief to know that Jews around the world don't trust each other's kashrut any more than we do in New York.

There are always too many articles to read in our short time together. As Cantor Eric says, every time, with the same tone of surprise in his voice, "We might not get through all of them." But we certainly make the effort, and whatever we skip gets a summary and a recommendation for further reading. Cantor Eric found funny stories, and obscure stories, and surprisingly important Jews from all of these places. A Jewish general in India who turned the tides of war, a Sephardi Jew in London who became prime minister and accidentally changed Jewish identity from religion to blood (Disraeli, who converted to Christianity but retained pride in his Jewish birth). We learned about Jews of every color, and educational level, and caste. Jews in Ireland and Alaska and Cuba and Myanmar and the Philippines, who don't think of pastrami on rye as the center of the Jewish food world.

For our final continent we studied Africa, bypassing the bigger African Jewish communities of Morocco, South Africa, and Ethiopia, and focusing on the lesser known and more recently discovered groups in Nigeria, Uganda, Zimbabwe, and Ghana. There's something magical about finding Jews in all corners of the earth. It's like a *Where's Waldo* puzzle. We are a far flung people. We've been scattered to the four corners any number of times throughout history and its only now that we have the state of Israel that we're making a concerted effort to bring everyone back together again.

Cantor Eric chooses a different topic each year and then delves into the subject over five or six Friday night dinners, you can come to all of them, or just to one or two and not feel left out. You can come to the dinner or only come to the discussion afterwards. We meet in the blue room and sit at round tables and light candles and say Kiddush, and eat Eggplant Parmesan and salad and pasta. We have to be reminded, every time, not to trip on the invisible corner of the platform by the ark. We re-hear the stories of bloody head injuries and they become more gruesome each time. So we politely line up on the other side of the counter to get our food, and avoid certain death.

The high point of the year, if only for variety, was the night we studied Jews in India, because instead of our regular dairy Italian dinner, we splurged on Indian food: Saag Paneer, Aloo Gobi, Naan!

After we've had our fill of food and colorful stories, we roll down the hall to the main sanctuary for Friday night services, and we remember, all over again, that our own little corner of the Jewish world is connected to every other Jewish community in the world. We are never alone.
