YOM KIPPUR AS THE ECLIPSE OF ROSH HASHANA

Dear Friends,

Although the sun's corona is constant, because of the sun's brilliance, the corona is only visible to the naked eye at the time of an eclipse. August 21st gave scientists the opportunity to see the corona clearly, and, in some states, completely. In nature, you sometimes need temporary darkness to see the light in its fullness. One could say the same about nations. The violence in Charlottesville, Virginia, precipitated by the darkness of hatred, then compounded by the remarks of President Trump, also revealed the light of goodness, which was evident in the all but universal condemnation of the actions of alt-right demonstrators and perpetrators, in the many gatherings in support of those who opposed their actions, and in the contributions to organizations that work for equality and justice in our country.

The High Holidays provide the same opportunity for us as to see our individual 'coronas.' On Rosh HaShana we celebrate the separation of light from darkness and the creation of the sun and the moon. The brilliance of our own creation is shadowed by error and misdeed, which we confront in the ten days that bring us to Kol Nidray. By refraining from food and drink, and from bathing and intimacy for twenty-four-plus hours, we effectively rehearse death, the ultimate darkness. We sit together, each in our own eclipse, to emerge, we hope to new possibilities for life. Indeed, Yom Kippur is the day-long eclipse of Rosh HaShana, which is meant to bring us back to the best of ourselves.

As we approach this penitential season, my wish for each of you is that the full radiance of your corona will be revealed to you by time the shofar is sounded at Yom Kippur's end.

Shabbat Unplugged

My first year at RSNS, when we had a monthly musical service, it basically meant that Cantor Eric led the service and brought in Steve Belfer on piano and/or Rebecca Hirschwerk on guitar, and tried out a few new songs. Personally, I loved it. I grew up in a synagogue without any musical instruments in the service, so even a piano or a guitar feels like riches to me. But three years ago, with the addition of Solomon Hoffman, and a band made up of his musician friends and musicians in the congregation, our musical services have become rowdy and exciting.

There's the piano, drums, guitar, a violin and a saxophone. We've even had a flute and a cello at times. We do more *Kabbalat Shabbat* songs, some faster, some slower and sweeter. Even the *kavannah* before the *Amida* (The standing prayer) becomes a foot stomper on musical nights.

My personal favorite is an alternative to *Ahavat Olam* with words written by Rami Shapiro. The words alone are a transcendent ode to community that has been sitting in our prayer books waiting for us to discover it all along, but when you add the music, and the drum, it soars.

The first service in the Shabbat Unplugged series almost blew out the sound system, and had people tapping their toes and clapping their hands and even, almost, getting up to dance. As that year went on there were lovely surprises, like a composition by Solomon for piano and violin, played in memory of

George Blum (because he was a devotee of classical music; none of that modernist stuff), and a new (to us) version of the *Hashkiveinu*, and Cantor Eric teaching us Sephardic melodies at the piano.

Each year our repertoire grows, with a version of *Oseh Shalom* from a Jerusalem synagogue, or a new take on *Lechah Dodi*. Solomon has started to compose his own music for us to sing, finding new meaning in songs and prayers we thought we already knew.

A lot of the regulars remember Solomon, from his time in Gan Shalom and Synagogue School, so seeing him there at the piano gives them a sense of pride – he's one of our own and look what he can do!

One of the best things about the musical services is that they are, more than any other service, truly inter-generational. They bring together the seniors, the parents, the singles, the teens, and the kids, and everyone sings along and laughs together and has a good time. And, of course, there's still the oneg (AKA snacks) afterwards to add to the joy.

I've been told that from the very beginning this was a musical congregation. Even when services were lay-led, we had musicians in the congregation, like Sam and Adele Blumenthal, and Judy Kaplan Eisenstein (a world renowned musicologist and daughter of Mordechai Kaplan). There's something about music, especially the kind you can sing at the top of your lungs, or sway along to, that makes prayer into a more full-bodied experience. Maybe someday we will get up the nerve to start dancing in the aisles.

Swim there if you want. Other activities offered include hiking in gorgeous woods, with your choice of difficulty and length for the hike, a leisurely walk, doing nothing, having time to explore on your own.

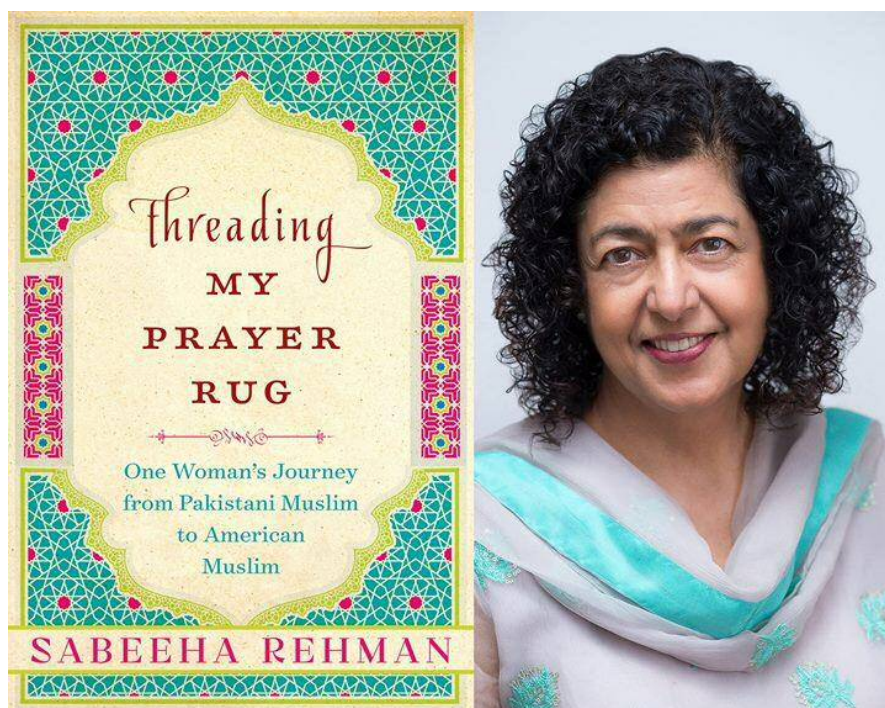
